



MATH CORNER

Improving numeracy is one of Yarrow's school goals. A good way to do this is through games. Each month the newsletter will include a game that you can play at home. Games can help build strategic thinking and problem-solving skills. Students learn to solve problems together, think strategically about what moves to make. Throughout a math game, students make a lot of strategic decisions as they problem solve and plan their next move.

CUP-STACKING PLACE VALUE GAME

You need styrofoam cups (or any cups with a lip so you can write a digit on the lip). Label each cup with a digit from 0-9 (I used a sharpie for this, and write the digit on both sides of the lip). Repeat for the number of cups you have. The number of cups you need depend on the number of people playing, and how high you wish your numbers to go. For a group of 3, playing to the hundred thousands, you will need 18 cups. (To work with numbers in the billions, students would build a pyramid with 10 cups.

As quickly as they can they need to stack 2-6 random cups in a pyramid, then collapse the pyramid so they have a stack of 2-6 cups. The first person to read the 2-6 digit number the stack makes, wins. To get all participating and keep the motivation going, you can give the first person 2 points, and everyone else in the group that reads their number correctly

1 point.



Upon "Go" make a pyramid or take 2 cups(depending on the age) stack and call out the number

CURRICULUM UDATE WHAT ARE CORE COMPETENCIES?

Unpacking the three Core Competencies



Communication -The Communication competency encompasses the knowledge, skills, processes and dispositions we associate with interactions with others. Through their communication, students acquire, develop and transform ideas and information, and make connections with others to share their ideas, express their individuality, further their learning, and get things done. The communication competency is fundamental to finding satisfaction, purpose and joy.



Thinking - The Thinking competency encompasses the knowledge, skills and processes we associate with intellectual development. It is through their competency as thinkers that students take subject-specific concepts and content and transform them into a new understanding. Thinking competence includes specific thinking skills as well as habits of mind, and metacognitive awareness. These are used to process information from a variety of sources, including thoughts and feelings that arise from the subconscious and unconscious mind and from embodied cognition, to create new understandings.



Personal and Social - The Personal and Social competency is the set of abilities that relate to students' identity in the world, both as individuals and as members of their community and society. Personal and social competency encompasses what students need to thrive as individuals, to understand and care about themselves and others, and to find and achieve their purposes in the world.

Communication, thinking and problem solving are weaved into all the subject areas. These competencies support student engagement and break down the process. Students focus on inquiry, exploration and discovery. A great example of this is our school wide portrait building in October. Students will visit our Art Studio and create a self portrait using loose parts. Come and check these out at the conferences on October 17.

Student Conferences

October marks the halfway point of term 1. On October 17th teachers will be inviting parents to come and have students showcase their work. Each teacher does this a bit differently. Please look for specific information from your child's teacher.
